Letter from President Brian Kaluzny

April's DCFF Members' Meeting

We don't usually cover what happened at the prior month's members' meeting, but maybe we should. The Tackle Time topic was just fascinating and very much worthwhile. It was done by Lou Komis, a long-time member and an outstanding fly fisher. But that was not what he talked about.

Lou Komis

Lou's topic was the danger of exposure to the sun. He is able to speak knowledgeably on this topic because of many skin problems that exposure to sunshine has caused for him.

He emphasized the importance of using highly rated sunscreens (90 +), wearing a hat, preferably one that is not widely vented and is made of material that will not allow invasion of the rays of the sun, and wearing clothing that is protective of sun's rays. Lou even wears gloves (made by Glacier), available via an on-line Bass Pro order, that protect the

hands and the area above the wrist that gets bare even when you are wearing long sleeves. And your face is very important to protect and the NOSE and EARS most of all.



This is a recent top view of Lou's scalp. The area that has been operated on started out the size of a dime. The dime was removed and skin adjacent to it was analyzed. Because that test showed more cancer was there more was removed. That was repeated until success was achieved. In this case the dime ended up about the size of a half-dollar.

Fishermen are more susceptible to serious bad effects because the water which is often around us reflects the sun's rays, thereby seriously increasing the danger of the situation.

A very dangerous act is to show a growth on your skin to your wife, a friend, or even to yourself in a mirror. An untrained eye may declare a very dangerous situation as "no problem". Should the growth be skin cancer, postponement of treatment can lead to very serious problems or even to death. This is a most serious matter.

Your physician who is a GP may not be the one to count on. I personally showed my long term and very capable GP a growth on my cheek, right above the point where your jaw flexes. She declared it "no problem". I fortunately had an appointment a few weeks later with a dermatologist. He no more than entered the room before declaring that growth to be a melanoma, a very dangerous skin cancer absolutely capable of spreading and of causing death. Surgery followed immediately and after two efforts, the first of which did not get it all, I was declared OK. Several additional checks in the last four years find it is still so. But I see a dermatologist every six months to assure I am OK elsewhere. Lou has had similar experience as well. Please take all of this most seriously.

Charlie Logsdon

Lou's presentation was followed by one by Charlie Logsdon, DCFF member and Property Manager at Kentucky's Otter Creek Park. Charlie talked about White Bass (Striper) fishing, mostly as done with a fly rod. This guy is an outdoorsman's outdoorsman! It was fascinating!

Boiling it down, Charlie likes to use a 4 weight rod using about an 8' Jack's leader made with 8 pound fluorocarbon, and casting a 8 or 10 size streamer fly tied light and weightedd so as to have the hook point up. The fish are usually found where fast water dumps into a pool. They will be attracted to the fly that is dark on top and light underneath and is low enough in the water to be out of the angler's sight.. Charlie's favorite pattern is chartreuse on top, white or light below, with a bright crystal flash as the lateral line. He also thinks tying with red thread is often beneficial. The white bass spawning runs might begin as early as mid-January but are usually later in the Spring. Limits in Kentucky run 15 per angler. And then he adds tales of occasionally picking up one of the larger striper species, or maybe a 4 to 7 pound walleye! Thank the Lord for folks like Charlie! It was a great lecture!
