He now offers a guide service to help anglers fish Hatchery Creek. Brad will be our speaker at the April members meeting. Also, membership in Derby City Fly Fishers is not necessary in order to attend class and receive the treatment described above.

There are lots of fly fishers in DCFF, and, naturally, lots of trips are taken. What newcomers need to understand is that only club members who have paid their dues are allowed to go on trips sponsored by Derby City Fly Fishers. We strictly enforce that rule because if we do not we jeopardize our insurance coverage.

February 18- 24th . Florida Fly Fishing Trip Report: Boca Grande, Gasparilla Island.

I have had the delightful and fortunate experience of fly fishing and just fishing Florida's backcountry and near shore saltwater of Florida. I have owned a flats boat since 2005. I trailer it from Indiana to our Florida fishing destinations. My angling partner John and I fish from the Florida Panhandle, St. Joe Harbor, Tampa, Sarasota, Charlotte's Harbor, Everglades and down to visit my favorite sister in Key West.

That's a lot of water. We know some of it, but not as well as we should. Successful fishing no matter where you are relies on one single most factor - knowing the habitat, knowing where the fish like to be. That's true of Blue River, Otter Creek, Cumberland River and saltwater. Knowing what they like to eat helps too!

The reason we hire guides is because they know their home waters and their fish habits. Their local knowledge helps us catch more fish. Now John and I are not saltwater guide quality yet but after years of dabbling and wetting lines along the Gulf Coast and Florida Keys we have finally selected our home waters.



Gasparilla Island of Boca Grande Pass is our choice. Here's why: the fishing can be incredible, the fishing is easy and accessible, and boating is as safe as the boat captain, fishable waters are easily accessible with kayak, flats boat or bay boat. Mangrove backcountry and flats kayak fishing commonly has a success rate that exceeds fishing from boats, even the skinny flats boats.

We stay at a hotel called the InnLet On The Waterfront, Boca Grande on Gasparilla Island. Efficiencies have two queen beds, a two burner kitchen stove with a small refrigerator and a bathroom with a roomy shower. Cost is about \$200 per night (\$100 per person). A boat slip is available for another \$35 per day and is located immediately out the room's back door. Really, ten steps and I am loaded into the boat and ready to go. The cost may seem pricey but once you consider the convenience and savings of not commuting with a boat and trailer, driving your vehicle and cooking your own meals it becomes more affordable. We take a camp stove and do all of our fish cooking outside the room on a picnic table. If the fish catching is really good we sometimes feed what seems like the entire guest list of the hotel. Other hotel anglers pitch in their catch also. It is kind of like a tropical trout camp food experience; on a good day nobody steps away from the table hungry.



We purchase, pack and transport most of our groceries for the stay before entering the island, including our refreshments. If you do forget key ingredients, run out of beer or want a great steak to grill a ¼ mile walk will bring you to the doorstep of the island's Hudson's Grocery.

I do catch fish with a fly rod; John spin fishes and catches supper. The species list includes sea trout, snapper, sheepshead, grouper, snook, Spanish mackerel, cobia and more.

Some flies, fishing lures and tackle are available at the local hardware store and one outfitter shop. But you are much better off if you come with your own supply of flies, lures and accessories. Fly shops these days are mostly clothing and sandal outlets. The best live baits for Gasparilla (Florida) fishing are of course live shrimp and pin fish. Bait is available at the local marina. We do not limit ourselves to just fly fishing. We do it all. A shrimp floating beneath a clacker is fun too!

Gasparilla is a gated community island. Cost for a truck and boat on a trailer to enter the Island is about \$11.00. There is a State Park with a historic lighthouse located at the south end of the island with a public beach and good shore fishing.

Florida fishing guides do operate out of the InnLet ramp. It is not a secret fishing destination it is just a good time fishing place.

I will gladly share any information or trip knowledge with any club member that is interested.

A WEEK ON THE RIVER The Making of New Friends

As Co-founder of the Kentuckiana Fly Tyers, I felt it was necessary to reach out to other fly fishers, and to the other fly fishing organizations in our community, those being Trout Unlimited and the Derby City Fly Fishers, to keep sort of a liaison between us all. Being a member of both organizations, but having spent little time in their respective functions, or activities, I was anxious to start the year out differently.

Last summer, while volunteering at a Casting for Recovery Retreat, I heard about, and was invited to go on a winter fly fishing trip among a group of friends to the River Ridge Inn, located in Arkansas, a kind of fishing lodge on the North Fork River, or as the locals have renamed it, the Norfork. A name that has been permanently etched for evermore in all references to it.

Six months later, I contacted George Tipker, an organizer of this winter adventure, who also presently serves as the president of Derby City Fly Fishers, about possibly Roy Weeks, my partner and other co-founder of Kentuckiana Fly Tyers, and myself going on the trip. George invited us, and kept us informed all of January and February of what we would need as to clothing for the UNPREDICTABLE February weather, and what we could expect when we arrived in Arkansas. George even went as far as to invite the others who were going on the outing to come to our February fly tying meeting at Orvis to finalize the trip with the arranging of carpooling and the time of departure.

Roy and I left on Sunday morning around seven and having been to Mountain Home on several occasions in the past for the Sow Bug Festival and the Southern Conclave, both of which we have fly tied at, knew how long of a trip it was going to be, so we had plenty of time for discussion about what we were about to venture into. We were uncertain of what to expect as far as how we would be received by the others, none of whom we knew much of, and we both felt we could possibly be in for a long week of alone time.

Upon arrival, we were met by George, who welcomed us with genuine sincerity and a handshake to make us feel really wanted. He informed us that the others were already out on the river, and he was going to meet them and invited us to join them after we checked in and unpacked. Roy and I decided to go to the dam on the Norfork, and try our luck there, since the generation was off, and the water was wadable, which hasn't been the case on our past trips there. We fished till dark, but really didn't have any luck, and were feeling tired from the drive, and decided to go back and meet the other members of our group.

Back at the inn, George introduced us to the others, Joe Gahlinger, Brian Kaluzny, Mark Rougeux, Ralph Swallows, and Don Temple. They had dinner started, Roy and myself stayed out of the way. I must admit, that the meals were well planned for the week. Everyone took turns cooking, but Roy and me, but we cleaned up and did the dishes. After dinner we sat around and talked about the day's fishing, and what was in store for tomorrow. Much discussion was on the time that all were going to get on the water and where they would put their kayaks in. This seemed to be the main topic each evening after dinner.



Each morning, Ralph had the coffee going, and the others got up early and were out of the inn before Roy and I got up. They went their way and we fished ours. Each night we talked about the day's catch, what they were caught on, and how big they were. No one ever mentioned about us not fishing with the others, and that made it more relaxing for us. We tied flies in the evening and showed others certain patterns that seem effective.

This is the way it was all week. No one seemed out of place, and all were very cordial. Brian and Mark had to leave on Friday, and the rest of us were sorry to see them leave. We did more fishing on the weekend and headed home Sunday morning.



The people that Roy and I met on this trip made the week more enjoyable than you can imagine. No one cared that we didn't fish as much as the others, or that we were from a different organization, kind of outsiders if you will. We had meetings that we had to attend for the upcoming sow bug festival. We went to different fishing locations than the others, but none of that mattered. I can say that we made some new friends and comrades to fish with in the future.

If you were ever thinking of going on a fly fishing outing but were hesitant about if you would fit in... don't fret about it. Brian, Joe, Mark, Ralph, Don, and of course George will make you feel like you're just one of the guys. And I think most fly fishers will make you feel the same way. I can speak for Roy on this when we say thank you all for making our week on the river, a place where we made some new friends.

I hope that in the future, all fly fishers, and all the fly fishing organizations, will be this open with members from other groups. I can say that Derby City has put the welcome mat out for all.
