

# Helm's Landing - Cumberland River, August 2017 by Wes Krupiczowicz, George Tipker and Mark

We had a full house at Paula's Riverside Retreat with all 4 rooms in the main building occupied. Joining us on the trip were Steve Koon and Steve Pugh (DCFF members from Madisonville Kentucky). Don Temple, Joe Gahlinger, and Bob Hancock from the Louisville Area. Kenneth Kloeppel (DCFF member from Nashville) joined us on Saturday afternoon. We also had a pair of Black Vultures join us on the deck (uninvited). And of course, Paula's rescue Labs, Eva and Buck, always on the lookout for handouts and love!

As usual for a club trip, there was rain, but there was also a good bit of sunshine to keep things toasty on the river.

Lake Cumberland had started to develop a strong thermocline and river water quality (specifically oxygen content) had started to decline the week before. That led the Corp of Engineers to quit running a normal on/off generation schedule in favor of more steady generation and finally opening a sluice gate 24/7 to get more oxygen in the river. So the first part of the trip was high water and the last part of the trip was actually low water with a constant 1600 CFS from the sluice gate and then generation late in the afternoon.

The result of all this variety? We caught fish from the Dam all the way down to Burkesville, but did not have high catch rate days with the higher water. Streamers tended to be more effective during high water and we pounded the banks. Inside bends with woody structure were typically productive.











With the sluice gate open and no generation, both nymphing and streamer fishing were very good with high catch rates. You could wade at the island below the dam and swing streamers - you just need a boat to get there. Floating was also easier at the lowers flow rates and both nymphing and streamer fishing were productive.

Wes fished Hatchery Creek and is happy to report the fish are there in good numbers. And so are the weeds! The banks are pretty well grown up with weeds and watercress has covered all the woody structure in the creek. You had to manage your line on the bank to keep from getting tangled in the weeds. You also had to pick a spot relatively free of water cress to fight and land a fish if you were able to hook up.

A number of flies took fish. Best nymphs were the chartreuse and the orange mop fly, egg patterns, Olive Hare's Ear (#16), Rainbow Warrior (#18), Crackleback, and the Trout Magnet. Effective streamers included the Chicago Fly, Olive Wooly Bugger, and a Yellow Sculpzilla.

#### **Two Kinds of Trips**

There are lots of fly fishers in DCFF, and, naturally, lots of trips are taken. What newcomers need to understand is that only club members who have paid their dues are permitted to go on trips sponsored by Derby City Fly Fishers. We strictly enforce that rule, because if we do not, we jeopardize our insurance coverage.

There are other trips organized by individuals who would like to go someplace together and fish. The rule stated above does not apply to that sort of trip. You will see that we report on either kind of trip in this newsletter.
