## The Montana Stonefly By Lew Oatman

Step-by-step Instructions and photos by Matt Clements

The pattern for the 2019 Mystery Fly for Cancer Tournament is the Montana Stonefly. Designed by Lew Oatman of Shushan, New York, this fly was designed to imitate large dark stonefly nymphs. Lew (Lewis Morris Oatman, Jr. 1902-1958) lived in the small town near the New York/Vermont border, along the lower Battenkill River. He is most well-known for his "exact imitation" streamer patterns, that were designed to closely match forage fish in his local waters.

We will be using:

Hook: Mustad 9671 hook (3x long, 1x heavy), size 10

Weight: Non-lead wire, size .020, 7 wraps

**Thread:** Uni-thread, Black, 8/0 **Tail:** Black Rooster Hackle Fibers

**Body:** Black Ultra-chenille, Standard Size **Wing Case:** Black Ultra-Chenille, 2 strands

Legs: Black Rooster Hackle


Thorax: Medium Chenille, Yellow



Start the thread and go back and forth over the wire a few times to secure it in place. It should be just a hair more than an eye length behind the eye



Tie in about a dozen fibers from a rooster hackle (from closer to the butt than the tip, but not the fluffy, webby barbules).





Tie in a piece of Ultra Chenille (I keep it on the card, loosen what I need to work with). Tie down to the beginning of the bend of the hook.

Wrap the chenille forward in tight touching wraps. (In this case, I got 7 wraps in.

Tie off the chenille, should be a small gap before the lead.

Tie in two pieces of ultra-chenille on top of the hook. (I use one piece looped, tving in both ends, to minimize waste.)



Peel the barbules off the top side of the feather (this is where your tail ought to come from.)









Tie in the chenille, again, on the near side of the fly, you can allow it to walk up the side, this makes getting the hackle wrapped a little easier.



Wrap the yellow chenille forward and tie off immediately in front of the lead wire, in this case three wraps.
