President's Letter

Fly Tying in Popular Culture By Matt Clements

And, of course, by popular culture, I'm referring to Hollywood productions.

Movies and TV, showing sports of all types, occasionally even fly fishing.

There are even occasions where characters will go fly fishing.

The first season of The Walking Dead, episode 4, starts with a poorly written discussion between two sisters sitting in a canoe with fly rods. Dad taught one to fish with "wet lures" and they kept everything, the other only with "dry lures" and only practiced catch and release.

They just sat holding the rods and staring like they were watching bobbers, sitting in the middle of a water filled quarry.

A romantic comedy came out a decade ago titled, and about "salmon fishing in the Yemen." I cannot recommend it.

Blah blah A River Runs Through It blah blah blah.

There was a documentary about the Hardy brothers, manufacturers of tackle. "The lost world of Mr. Hardy." It discusses today and reels, and the selling of flies, but nothing of the tying.

A documentary named Kiss the Water came out a few years later, about the life of Megan Boyd, a Scottish woman who made a life of fly tying, whose flies are highly sought after collectibles, and who worked flying ties until she was unable. To the point that she refused an invitation to London to receive an award from the queen, because she had no one to look after her dog. People would go to learn to tie salmon flies from her. She would have them spend days on each part of one fly, cutting off the work, and telling them to start over. We would never get through a club tying class with that approach. The documentary intersperses location shots with a close up of someone tying a salmon fly with an old vice in a dark room.

That is all of the fly tying references I can think of. It just isn't something that you see on tv. It doesn't exist in pop culture.

But I was watching the current iteration of Loony Toons with Eli. And there it was, for a glorious two seconds!

I was overly excited, I called Jessy into the room, rewound the episode, she was excited. We rewound it again.

All of this due to the brief moment that Porky Pig popped onto an episode to answer a question...

The world is changing...fly tying is becoming mainstream!


