

President's Letter



Derby City Luck!

The 149th running of the Kentucky Derby was a smashing success with record attendance and beautiful weather. There were surely many lucky people at the

track last week and a few unlucky folks too. A good friend of mine had a \$30 win and place ticket that was on the money and paid big \$\$\$\$ for him. I don't know about you but picking horses is not my thing. I lost \$4 in a Derby betting pool Saturday and think that's the most I've ever won on the Derby. Hopefully you did better than me and your horse came in. But while betting horses is not something I'm lucky at, fishing seems to hold a few more lucky moments for me. I've been there at the right time, had the right fly and been at the right spot and luck was in my favor. The thing about luck is that it's unpredictable, you never know when it's going to come your way. Luck is just luck, that's it. You may have a lucky fishing spot, a lucky fly, a lucky rod, a lucky fishing partner or a lucky hat. Some days you just know luck is with you and it's going to be a good day. Well, luck was with me on a recent fishing trip and my horse came in, so to speak, and I won big. Here's the story.

The spring white bass run is a big thing for me. Catching white bass is a blast and when the run is on there's nothing quite like it. When the water is right and the fish are on, everyone is lucky. You can catch one on almost every cast and catch dozens in no time at all. The white bass strike aggressively and fight as hard as any fish that swims. A good day on the water when the run is hot will wear you out. You come off the water with a good kind of tired and know that you've been fishing. It's just one of the magical times of the year. The water is warming, the trees are starting to leaf out, and the flowers bloom. It's just the right time to get out there.

Nolin River has become my favorite spot for the white bass run. There's plenty of water to fish and plenty of good size white bass that make that run. The Nolin River is a beautiful area and the water is clean and moves with swift current. It's just hard to beat this river on water quality and fish numbers. My rig for white bass fishing is a 9.5 Ft 5wt with a 280 grain sinking line. You need a sinking line to get your fly down in the swift current of the river. The fly I use is a size 6 clouser. The color of the fly I use the most is orange. But I've caught fish on every color I've tried. I guess you could say orange is my lucky color. And speaking of luck, here's where luck came my way.

On a recent trip I had snagged my fly several times and lost a lot of flys. I was beginning to run low on flys and snagged my line. In an effort to salvage my fly I positioned the boat where I could reel down to the fly with my rod tip and try to get the fly unsnagged. This had worked several times for me and there was no reason to think it wouldn't work this time. So I positioned the boat and reeled down to the fly and began to make an effort to free it. Apparently I pulled too hard and my line broke. When I pulled my rod out of the water the tip was gone along with the fly. At first I thought I had broken the tip off the rod, but upon further inspection I realized the whole top section to the rod was completely gone. What a snag that was! We were in about 6 feet of water and the water was moving very swiftly. There was no way I could retrieve the rod section and my rod was useless. It was my favorite rod and it was rendered useless trying to save an inexpensive fly. Luck was not on my side that day. However, I improvised and used a backup rod to finish the day without too many other snags.

Since the run was on we decided to fish the next day and I returned to Nolin River the next day. I had told the story of losing the rod tip along with news of the white bass run to several members of the Derby City Fly Club. Wes

Krupiczewicz and Lew Komos were on the river that day and began fishing in the same general area of the river we were in. We were soon separated by a good distance and lost sight of each other. It was another day of good fishing as the white bass run continued to produce. The day passed quickly and toward the end of the day we met up with Wes and Lew again. Their fishing had been good too. Wes had a big grin on his face and talked of all the fish he and Lew had caught. Then Wes made the statement, "you'll never believe what I caught". I was sure it was some kind of large fish or something really unusual. Then he held up my rod tip! Luck had surely showed up and was on my side. Think of it, what are the odds that a member of Derby City Fly Fishers, would be in the same section of water, would snag my rod tip, and that I would be on the water the same day. There are several miles of swift water and there's no telling how far the rod tip had moved. The odds are pretty phenomenal that all that would come together. That's what I call Derby City Luck!
